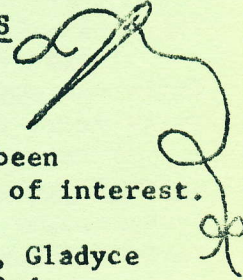

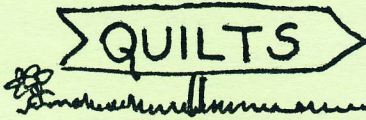
I would encourage each member to share bright ideas for programming, structure, activities, etc. with a member of the Executive Board.

Each month a member will be selected at random for this column. Let us introduce you to Pat Cole. . .

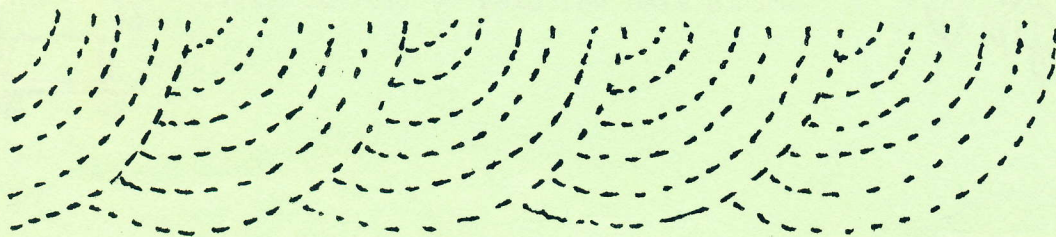
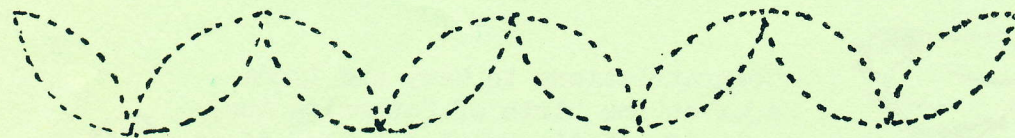

REPORTED-AT-LARGE PAT HACKLEY

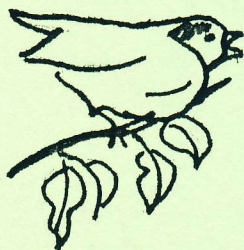

Mrs. Mathieson was featured in the September, 1981 issue of QUILTERS NEWS-LETTER. She teaches quilting in the Los Angeles area and lectures throughout the United States. We found her to be a very energetic and personable woman.

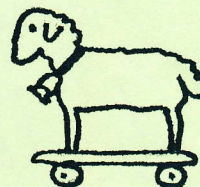
The program included slides of her work and work of others. She also displayed examples of her "puzzle" quilts and quilts made for hoops. Judy likes to work with geometric designs and uses a computer to print out possible color combinations.

Judy treats quilting as her profession and works long hours. A current project is a quilted map of the Los Angeles area. And her latest "in" design is the Mariner's Compass and it's variations. She confesses to collecting fabric and among her favorites are imported fabrics, such as Liberty of London. She usually buys at least enough fabric for a blouse, though the fabric is seldom sewn into wearables.

3. Officers installed at May meeting.

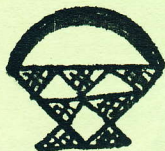
4. Outgoing officers pass on all records and materials at May meeting.

Workshops shall be held on the fourth Monday of each month except December.



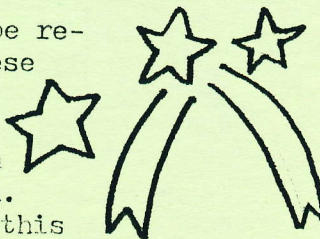
Don't forget to bring your basket quilts to the May meeting.
