Also in March . . . a slide show preview of the 1988 State Quilt Guild Symposium.







ARTICLE V ELECTED OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES


Add new section:


ATTENTION: WINNERS OF FRIENDSHIP BLOCKS

APRIL FRIENDSHIP BLOCK



Spring Tulip 7" x 9 1/4"

Spring Tulip is a relatively simple block that can be designed into a wall-hanging, used in a border design; floating in a quilt, it's up to you.

Color selections:

Outside border: colonial blue

or sky blue

Background:

gray

Tulip:

med. purple &

dark purple .

Stem & leaves: green

General Instructions:

-Use 100% cotton fabric.

-Pre-wash all fabric.

-Add 1/4" seam allowance to templates.

-Press all pieces as you go.

Sewing Instructions:


See illustrations on opposite side of the page. Please note only the right side of the block is showing. The left side of the block is the same except in reverse. Remember when marking your fabrics just to turn your templates upside down for the left portion of your tulip.


Sew: Unit A as illustrated Unit B as illustrated -for the right side of the tulip.


Sew: Unit A pieces 1-3
Unit B pieces 5,6, &8
for the left portion of
the tulip.

Sew all four units together and then add all four side borders (Unit C).

GETTING ACQUAINTED ... With Louise Howey

Louise was the first president of Lincoln Quilters Guild, 1973-'74. She became interested in quilting in the '30's when she married. Louise and her mother-in-law quilted together. They not only quilted their own pieces, but received tops in the mail from people in Chicago, Kentucky and other parts of the country. Louise isn't sure how so many people knew of the quilters from Lincoln!

When Louise began quilting, there weren't the monthly publications now available, nor were there as many quilters locally. To keep up with quilting trends and other quilters, Louise was a member of a 'round robin,' corresponding with quilters nationally. What a treasure to be a part of special people and to look back on these letters now to see all the changes that have taken place in the quilting world.

Louise says that piecing quilts is a favorite — usually using conventional patterns with a change here and there. She believes that the March meeting 15 years ago, held at Mary Ghormley's home, with 10 — 15 present, was just as exciting as this meeting in 1988. As Louise remembers, officers were elected by simply announcing who they were "we wanted to get going."

CREATIVE HOUSEKEEPING by Shelly Burge



Whenever I meet someone for the first time and I tell them that I am a quilter, their response is usually, "Oh that's wonderful but I would never have the patience." I have never understood that remark because I think it takes patience to do housework, cook meals and do the laundry. I am always impatient to get those chores out of the way so I can get back to my quilting.

When a group of quilters get together the topic of conversation is often how they have trouble fitting time to work on their current quilt projects into their busy schedules. On the other hand, I have trouble fitting housework into my busy quilting schedule.


As quilting has absorbed more and more of my time, I have developed little housekeeping short cuts and time saving tips that help me get my work out of the way so I can get back to my sewing room and the fun stuff. I have been asked to share some of these shortcuts with my fellow quilters. I hope you find them useful.

- Tip #1: Set a small goal to be accomplished each day. I try to clean one room per day. way at least one room looks good even if the rest of the house is a disaster.
- Tip #2: Work-saving appliances can be big time savers. I have an automatic dishwasher (my fifteen year old daughter).
- Tip #3: Never do today what can be put This off until tomorrow. applies to housework, not quilting.
- Tip #4: Remember that pepperoni pizza contains all four food groups.



- Tip #5: Throw a big party once a year. This is a great incentive to do a thorough house cleaning. I usually keep putting it off until three days before the party and then I panic and call Merry Maids.
- Tip #6: There's nothin' says lovin' like something from the oven. There is nothing like the aroma of freshly baked cookies and if you squeeze the dough from the plastic tube into a bowl and mash it around a little, the kids will think you made it yourself.
- Tip #7: Have an understanding family who is willing to pitch in to lend a hand with household chores and understand that when Mom has time for her creative endeavors she is a happier and healthier person.

I hope you will find these tips helpful in organizing your schedule. You may find you have so much time for your sewing projects you might even get those buttons sewn on your husband's shirts.

NEBRASKA QUILT PROJECT



The final report is being prepared for the National Endowment for the Arts, and while Frankie Best is working with figures, she thought you might enjoy knowing some of the personhours and dollars expended in the past twelve months towards this effort.

The total cost of the project was \$74,235.99, of which \$17,500.00 came from the National Endowment for the Arts. The balance of the budget came from labor and cash in kind. Labor includes that of the committee (6591 hours) as well as site chairmen and their volunteers (3422 hours).

Cash in kind donations came from the labor on the construction of the quilt photography frame, labor from Words, Etc., rental on the camera, VCR, projector, typewriter, conference room, plus other miscellaneous expenses.

<u>Update</u>: The NEBRASKA QUILT PROJECT has received notice that they have met necessary preliminary criteria and have been invited to approach the National Endowment for the Arts for funding for Quilt History Days in Lincoln and Omaha.
